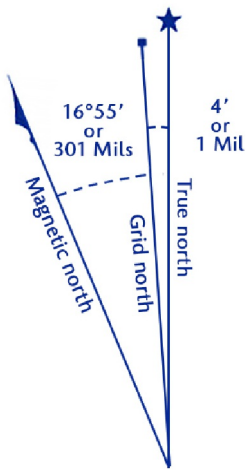

Whale Cove Loop is best enjoyed as a day trip. This 9 km route (with a 2 km detour each way to Upper Bar Harbour) includes 5 portages, totalling 930 metres.

The access point is at the municipal boat launch at 1030 Terence Bay Road.

The stream leading to Round Pond can only be paddled at high tide. Be sure to check the tide schedule before you leave.

Anglers must follow rules outlined in the Nova Scotia Anglers' Handbook, published by the Department of Fisheries and Aquaculture. Catch and release fishing is encouraged within the wilderness area.

Navigating on open water, especially on the ocean, can be hazardous when windy or when heavy swell is present. Use caution and be prepared to wait for better conditions. If travelling on ice, ensure conditions are safe wherever you go.

Some portage trails may not be marked or maintained. Be prepared to navigate through dense brush and fallen trees.

If you choose to light a campfire, use an existing fire ring or bring your own fire pan. Make sure no fire ban is in effect. Firewood may only be collected from fallen, dead wood. Never leave your campfire unattended and thoroughly extinguish it when you do.

Campsites are available on a first come-first serve basis. "No trace" camping must be practiced. Please pack out all litter. Dispose human waste in your own latrine hole well away from a campsite or water source.

Please tread lightly. Check Nova Scotia Environment's Keep it Wild brochure for standards and Leave no Trace principles. Unauthorized vehicle use is not permitted in wilderness areas. If you see or suspect illegal activity, please call the province's toll-free reporting line: 1-800-565-2224.
